

Correspondence Courses Offered

Course Number/Name	Credits	Course Description
BL101 , Pentateuch	3	A study of the "five books of Moses" or "the Law", it portrays God's leadership of the Hebrew people from their inception through the miraculous deliverance and their preparation for entering the Promised Land.
BL102 , Historical Books	3	A study is made of Israel's history as recorded in Joshua through Nehemiah: the Davidic Covenant, the rise and fall of the monarchy and the exile and return of the remnant.
BL103 , Genesis	2	A systematic study of the foundational and doctrinal truths taught in Genesis.
BL104 , Exodus	2	A systematic study of the theological and doctrinal truths taught in Exodus.
BL105 , History of English Bible	2	A survey of the antiquity and preservation of the Bible in the English language.
BL200 , New Testament Survey	2	An overview of the New Testament with emphasis upon the historical and geographical setting.
BL201 , Life of Christ	2	A study of the Synoptic Gospels with attention to the outstanding events and teachings of the Lord.
BL202 , Acts	2	This is an examination of the book of Acts. With a careful study of the early church, including its origin, character, activity and experience.
BL203 , Hermeneutics	2	A study of the history, principles, and methods of Biblical interpretation. Emphasis is upon the literal, grammatical, and historical methods of interpretation.
BL205 , Philippians	2	A verse-by-verse study of the epistle of Paul to the church at Philippi.
BL206 , Pastoral Epistles	2	A verse-by-verse study of I and II Timothy, and Titus. Attention is given to the relationship of the pastor to the local church and to the many problems that may confront him.
BL301 , Bible Doctrines I	2	A detailed and systematic study of the doctrines of God the Father (Theology proper) and Revelation (Bibliology).
BL302 , Bible Doctrines II	2	A detailed and systematic study of the doctrines Christ (Christology) and the Holy Spirit (Pneumatology).
BL303 , Daniel	2	A verse-by-verse exposition of the book of Daniel, showing how Daniel is the key to prophetic revelation.

Course Number/Name	Credits	Course Description
BL305 , John	2	A chapter-by-chapter study of this unique Gospel with careful attention to the proof of the deity of Jesus Christ.
BL306 , Prison Epistles	2	A verse-by-verse study and comparison of the Apostle Paul's epistles composed while in prison: Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon.
BL401 , Bible Doctrines III	2	A detailed and systematic study of the Doctrines of Man, Sin, Salvation, Spirit Beings, and the Church
BL402 , Bible Doctrines IV	2	A detailed and systematic study of history's last days (Eschatology) as prophesied in Scripture.
BL403 , Poetical Books	2	This course is designed to give the student a basic understanding of the elements of Hebrew poetry. The books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Song of Solomon, and Ecclesiastes are surveyed. Prerequisite is BL102.
BL407 , Major Prophets	2	This grammatical, historical study of the Major Prophets with special attention to the coming Kingdom of Christ.
BL408 , Minor Prophets	2	This grammatical, historical study of the Minor Prophets gives special emphasis to eschatological elements, as well as personal application.
BL409 , I Corinthians	2	This course is an expository analysis of the first epistle of Paul to the church at Corinth in its historical setting.
BL410 , II Corinthians	2	Continuing analysis of the second epistle of Paul to the church at Corinth. Special attention is given to the application of passages to the church today.
BL411 , Romans	2	A brief study is made of the historical background of the church in Rome as well as a detailed study of the contents of the book. The major doctrines are emphasized.
BL412 , Revelation	2	This study emphasizes the historical setting and future fulfillment of the book of Revelation. Various methods of interpretation are discussed with special emphasis on the futuristic interpretation.
BL413 , Hebrews	2	This verse by verse study of the book of Hebrews demonstrates the superiority of the finished work of Christ over the Old Testament figures, ordinances, priesthood, sacrificial system, and covenant.
BL415 , Matthew	2	A study of the Gospel of Matthew, examining the proofs of Jesus' right to the Throne of the Kingdom of Heaven.
BL418 , Between the Testaments	2	An historical survey of the period between the writing of the new and old testaments.

Course Number/Name	Credits	Course Description
Ed100 , Intro to Education	2	This course acquaints the student with the history of education. It is designed to establish a foundation for other education courses.
Ed203 , Methods in Education	3	Principles of teaching are discussed, as well as methods adaptable to the student learning process.
Ed315 , Teaching Elem. Math	3	The needed skills used to facilitate the learning process of elementary school children include methods, games, helps, and teaching aids in the area of mathematics instruction.
Ed400 , Directed Student Teachi	4	Prerequisites: 1. Senior ranking; 2. 20 hours of education completed; 3. Approval of education department to begin student teaching; 4. Acceptance by one of the schools working with Midwestern Baptist College in the Directed Teaching Program.
Ed406 , Educational Research	3	This course explores the methods of Education.
Ed415 , Christian School Admin	3	A course which covers the administration and organizational skills needed to run a Christian school.
En102 , English Comp	3	Oral and written essays, creative writing, and two formal research papers are required.
En201 , American Literature	3	The chief works of major authors in American literature from the seventeenth century to the present are studied. The influence of these authors on literary tradition and values is discussed in the historical context.
En202 , English Literature	3	A study is made of the chief works of major authors in English literature from the Middle Ages to the present. Works are examined in their historical context, emphasizing the effect on literature, on cultural traditions, and on values. Prerequisite: En101 and En102.
En404 , Homiletical Grammar	3	Homiletical Grammar is a study of diagrammatical analysis, laying a foundation for exegetical research in the Word of God.
Ev101 , Personal Evang. 1	1	This study of the philosophy of evangelism, its scriptural basis and methods of evangelism includes the study of personal evangelism, as well as house-to-house calling for the local church. Personal Evangelism is required of every student every semester (Ev101-402).
Hi101 , Western Civilization I	3	This survey of the origins and development of civilization is designed to provide students with an adequate background for understanding present institutions and cultures.
Hi102 , Western Civilization II	3	Second semester of Western Civilization.

Course Number/Name	Credits	Course Description
Hi201 , United States History I	3	Political, social, religious, and economic history from colonial times to the present is surveyed. The first semester covers the period prior to and including the War Between the States. The second semester includes the time of Reconstruction to the present.
Hi202 , United States History II	3	Second semester of United States History.
Hi301 , Church History I	2	The history of the Christian church is studied from the apostolic age to the present time. The first semester covers the apostolic age through the medieval period. The second semester considers the period from the Reformation to the twentieth century.
Hi302 , Church History II	2	Second semester of Hi301.
Mu101 , Basic Music Theory	2	This introductory course in music theory covers the fundamentals of music notation, scales, intervals, triads, and general terms. It provides an exposure to sight-singing and dictation.
Psy201 , Educational Psychology	3	Psychological theory and research findings are applied to the field of education. Major topics include the nature and direction of the learning process, motivation, discipline, the pupil's mental health, intelligence, critical and creative thinking and principles of human development applicable to the work of the teacher.
PT302 , Homiletics	2	Homiletics is the study of sermon building and proper outlining. The emphasis is on preaching that is effective for soul winning and for edifying believers. Practice preaching with critical analysis by class members, and oral reading of the Scriptures are emphasized.
PT404 , Baptist History and Poli	2	The development of Baptist churches is studied and related to their beginnings and backgrounds with a correlation in New Testament teaching on the administration and government of the church. Attention is given to the prominence of the local church and on Baptist distinctives.
Sc301 , Biological Science	3	This non-laboratory course in the fundamentals of biology includes botany, zoology, and human physiology. It also includes discussions of Bible related topics.
So201 , Intro to Sociology	2	The principles, concepts, methods, and terminology in the field of sociology are introduced. The relation of culture to group activities, and some of the major social institutions are analyzed.
