AL101	Spanish I	3	Basic course in the study of the syntax and vocabulary of the Spanish language. 1of2
AL102	Spanish II	3	Basic course in the study of the syntax and vocabulary of the Spanish language. 2of2
AL201	Greek I	3	A study of elementary Greek grammar, syntax and vocabulary. 1of2
AL202	Greek II	3	A study of elementary Greek grammar, syntax and vocabulary. 2of2
BL101	Pentateuch	3	A study of the "five books of Moses" or "the Law", it portrays God's leadership of the Hebrew people from their inception through the miraculous deliverance and their preparation for entering the Promised Land.
BL102	Historical Books	3	A study is made of Israel's history as recorded in Joshua through Nehemiah: the Davidic Covenant, the rise and fall of the monarchy and the exile and return of the remnant.
BL103	Genesis	2	A systematic study of the foundational and doctrinal truths taught in Genesis.
BL104	Exodus	2	A systematic study of the theological and doctrinal truths taught in Exodus.
BL105	History of English Bible	2	A survey of the antiquity and preservation of the Bible in the English language.
BL200	New Testament Survey	2	An overview of the New Testament with emphasis upon the historical and geographical setting.
BL201	Life of Christ	2	A study of the Synoptic Gospels with attention to the outstanding events and teachings of the Lord.
BL202	Acts	2	This is an examination of the book of Acts. With a careful study of the early church, including its origin, character, activity and experience.
BL203	Hermeneutics	2	A study of the history, principles, and methods of Biblical interpretation. Emphasis is upon the literal, grammatical, and historical methods of interpretation.
BL205	Philippians	2	A verse-by-verse study of the epistle of Paul to the church at Philippi.
BL206	Pastoral Epistles	2	A verse-by-verse study of I and II Timothy, and Titus. Attention is given to the relationship of the pastor to the local church and to the many problems that may confront him.
BL301	Bible Doctrines I	2	A detailed and systematic study of the doctrines of God the Father (Theology proper) and Revelation (Bibliology).
BL302	Bible Doctrines II	2	A detailed and systematic study of the doctrines Christ (Christology) and the Holy Spirit (Pneumatology).

Course #	Course Name	Credits	Course Description
BL303	Daniel	2	A verse-by-verse exposition of the book of Daniel, showing how Daniel is the key to prophetic revelation.
BL305	John	2	A chapter-by-chapter study of this unique Gospel with careful attention to the proof of the deity of Jesus Christ.
BL306	Prison Epistles	2	A verse-by-verse study and comparison of the Apostle Paul's epistles composed while in prison: Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon.
BL401	Bible Doctrines III	2	A detailed and systematic study of the Doctrines of Man, Sin, Salvation, Spirit Beings, and the Church
BL402	Bible Doctrines IV	2	A detailed and systematic study of history's last days (Eschatology) as prophesied in Scripture.
BL403	Poetical Books	2	This course is designed to give the student a basic understanding of the elements of Hebrew poetry. The books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Song of Solomon, and Ecclesiastes are surveyed. Prerequisite is BL102.
BL407	Major Prophets	2	This grammatical, historical study of the Major Prophets with special attention to the coming Kingdom of Christ.
BL408	Minor Prophets	2	This grammatical, historical study of the Minor Prophets gives special emphasis to eschatological elements, as well as personal application.
BL409	I Corinthians	2	This course is an expository analysis of the first epistle of Paul to the church at Corinth in its historical setting.
BL410	II Corinthians	2	Continuing analysis of the second epistle of Paul to the church at Corinth. Special attention is given to the application of passages to the church today.
BL411	Romans	2	A brief study is made of the historical background of the church in Rome as well as a detailed study of the contents of the book. The major doctrines are emphasized.
BL412	Revelation	2	This study emphasizes the historical setting and future fulfillment of the book of Revelation. Various methods of interpretation are discussed with special emphasis on the futuristic interpretation.
BL413	Hebrews	2	This verse by verse study of the book of Hebrews demonstrates the superiority of the finished work of Christ over the Old Testament figures, ordinances, priesthood, sacrificial system, and covenant.
BL414	Biblical Archeology	2	The science of antiquities related primarily to the Bible lands through monuments and excavated records enables the student to show, confirm, illuminate, and understand the dependability of the Holy Scriptures. Same as
BL415	Matthew	2	A study of the Gospel of Matthew, examining the proofs of Jesus' right to the Throne of the Kingdom of Heaven.
BL417	Manners and Customs	2	A course of study in the manners and customs of Bible times.
BL418	Between the Testaments	2	An historical survey of the period between the writing of the new and old testaments.

Course #	Course Name	Credits	Course Description
CM100	Church Planting I	1	This course is part of a seminar (CM100-400) leading to proficiency in planting and administering new churches. It is a practical study in leadership, stewardship and continuance of the work.
CM101	Christian Character	2	This is a survey of the implications of Biblical virtues in our lives today.
CM200	Church Planting II	1	This course is part of a seminar leading to proficiency in planting and administering new churches. It is totally practical in leadership, stewardship and continuance of the work. Classes are taught by experienced pastors who are church planters. Current problems and issues are thoroughly examined.
CM201	Youth Ministry	2	Biblical principles and practical methods of developing a local church youth program are presented. A study of the characteristics and needs of youth is also an important part of this course.
CM202	Gospel Artistry	2	Students are made aware of object lesson materials available for presentation of the Gospel. Subjects cover chalk talk, puppets, ventriloquism, experience in planning Junior Church, Vacation Bible School, bus ministry, etc.
CM203	Sunday School Admin.	2	An analysis is made of the basic principles of educational administration and their implications for the organization of the total program of the Sunday School.
CM206	Christian Wife	1	The Biblical principles of the home and church are applied to the areas of courtship, the Biblical role of husband and wife, discipline and training of children, and the management of money.
CM207	Christian Etiquette for Wo	1	The emphasis of this course is upon a potpourri of values, attitudes, and appearances of the Christian woman today. The course features rules of courtesy as applied to the area of home, church, and everyday living.
CM208	Christian Etiquette for Me	1	The emphasis of this course is upon a potpourri of values, attitudes, and appearances of the Christian woman today. The course features rules of courtesy as applied to the area of home, church, and everyday living.
CM221	Bus Ministry	2	Basic principles and practical methods of promoting the church bus ministry are studied in the light of the Great Commission.
CM302	Church Administration	2	A general study is made of the methods, financing, establishment and maintenance of New Testament churches. The course acquaints the student with every area of administration.
CM401	Christian Home	2	This course is a study of the Biblical principles of the home and the practical application of these principles to such areas as courtship, marital roles, discipline, training of children, and the management of money.
CM403	Church Law	2	A study of the law relating to and in prospective of the running of a church.

CM409	Personal Finance	2	A study of methods, principles, and practical applications in managing the finances of the home.
CS101	Keyboard Technique I	3	Instruction is given in the touch system of Keyboard Technique. Accuracy, rhythm, and speed are stressed. The formation of letters and other forms of written communication.
CS102	Keyboard Technique II	3	Continuation of Keyboard Technique CS101
CS111	Office Management I	2	The student is trained for a church secretarial position with practice in various skills demanded in the modern office.
CS201	Bookkeeping & Accountin	2	The student is instructed in the "language of business" through which an understanding is gained of general bookkeeping and accounting concepts and terminology.
CS202	Bookkeeping & Accountin	2	Second semester of CS201. Teaching use of computer software/spreadsheets.
CS310	Intro to Computers I	2	This course introduces the student to the personal computer. Emphasis is placed on the operation and maintenance.
CS311	Intro to Computers II	2	This course introduces the student to word processing, spreadsheet, database and internet applications.
CS312	Computer Applications	2	This course explores computer software available today and teaches the basic application of it for college students. (Adobe Photoshop, Microsoft Office, etc.)
CS410	Database Management	2	This course teaches building and maintaining a database using Microsoft Access.
CS417	Church Web Page	2	This course teaches the use of the html language for designing and maintaining a web site for Christian Ministry.
Ed100	Intro to Education	2	This course acquaints the student with the history of education. It is designed to establish a foundation for other education courses.
Ed201	Educational Psychology	3	(Same as Psy201) Psychological theory and research findings are applied to the field of education. Major topics include the nature and direction of the learning process, motivation, discipline, the pupils' mental health, intelligence, critical and creative thinking, and principles of human development applicable to the work of the teacher.
Ed203	Methods in Education	3	Principles of teaching are discussed, as well as methods adaptable to the student learning process.
Ed314	History and Phil. of Ed.	3	(same as Hi314) This course includes a review of the history of American education, a comparison of the most important philosophies of education, and a presentation of the Christian rationale for education.
Ed315	Teaching Elem. Math	3	The needed skills used to facilitate the learning process of elementary school children include methods, games, helps, and teaching aids in the area of mathematics instruction.

Ed400	Directed Student Teaching	4	Prerequisites: 1. Senior ranking; 2. 20 hours of education completed; 3. Approval of education department to begin student teaching; 4. Acceptance by one of the schools working with Midwestern Baptist College in the Directed Teaching Program.
Ed401	Directed Student Teaching	4	continuation of Ed400
Ed402	Practicum in Teacher Ed.	2	This real life approach to Student Teaching prepares the prospective teacher in the methodology of classroom instruction.
Ed404	Teaching Elem. Writing	3	This course for the future teacher includes hand dominance, recognition of size, color, and shape, execution of manuscript and cursive styles, proper slant and spacing of each, and a brief encounter with calligraphy.
Ed405	Teaching Elem. Reading	3	This course surveys the methods and psychology of teaching elementary students how to read.
Ed406	Educational Research	3	This course explores the methods of Education.
Ed411	Teaching Elem. Lang. Art	3	A course designed to teach the teacher of the language arts for elementary school students.
Ed415	Christian School Admin.	3	A course which covers the administration and organizational skills needed to run a Christian school.
Ed418	Teaching Elem. Science	3	This course surveys the methods and philosophy of teaching elementary students the sciences.
En101	English Grammar	3	The basic parts of speech, usage, sentence building, and punctuation are stressed, and techniques of expository writing are explored.
En102	English Comp	3	Oral and written essays, creative writing, and two formal research papers are required.
En201	American Literature	3	The chief works of major authors in American literature from the seventeenth century to the present are studied. The influence of these authors on literary tradition and values is discussed in the historical context.
En202	English Literature	3	A study is made of the chief works of major authors in English literature from the Middle Ages to the present. Works are examined in their historical context, emphasizing the effect on literature, on cultural traditions, and on values. Prerequisite: En101 and En102.
En206	Shakespeare	3	An in-depth study of the Elizabethan Age focuses on the life and works of William Shakespeare. This course may be taken as an elective or as a substitute for the requirement of English Literature.
En221	Publications I	2	(same as CS221) This class provides thorough experience in yearbook production. Techniques of journalism are stressed; layout design and schedule requirements are emphasized.
En222	Publications II	2	(same as CS222) Second semester of En221.

En401	Christian Literature	3	This survey of Christian literature emphasizes illustrations useful to preachers and Christian workers. Reading cover a broad spectrum of English and American literature.
En404	Homiletical Grammar	3	Homiletical Grammar is a study of diagrammatical analysis, laying a foundation for exegetical research in the Word of God.
Ev101	Personal Evang. 1	1	This study of the philosophy of evangelism, its scriptural basis and methods of evangelism includes the study of personal evangelism, as well as house-to-house calling for the local church. Personal Evangelism is required of every student every semester (Ev101-402).
Hi0305	History of Cults (grad)	4	Used on Martino, Robert program for Masters
Hi101	Western Civilization I	3	This survey of the origins and development of civilization is designed to provide students with an adequate background for understanding present institutions and cultures.
Hi102	Western Civilization II	3	Second semester of Western Civilization.
Hi201	United States History I	3	Political, social, religious, and economic history form colonial times to the present is surveyed. The first semester covers the period prior to and including the War Between the States. The second semester includes the time of Reconstruction to the present.
Hi202	United States History II	3	Second semester of United States History.
Hi301	Church History I	2	The history of the Christian church is studied from the apostolic age to the present time. The first semester covers the apostolic age through the medieval period. The second semester considers the period from the Reformation to the twentieth century.
Hi302	Church History II	2	Second semester of Hi301.
Hi305	History of Cults	2	The history and teachings of modern cult movements are studied. The main doctrines of the cults are analyzed in the light of Scriptural truth.
Hi314	History of Education	3	This course includes a review of the history of American education, a comparison of the most important philosophies of education, and a presentation of the Christian rationale for education.

Ma101	Basic Mathematics	2	Basic Mathematics is a general course which builds mathematics skills and understanding, including whole numbers, fractions, decimals, and other basic mathematical operations.

Mi301	Missions III	3	The study of past missions enterprises, beginning with Moravians through English missions. Includes biographies of great missionaries.
Mi302	Missions IV	3	In this course basic differences in the cultures of the world are surveyed in respect of missions work. Economics, politics, and religions are explored.
Mi342	Foreign Field Trip I	1	Students gain valuable missionary experience by participation in a trip to a foreign mission field. Credits arranged.
Mi343	Foreign Field Trip II	1	Second trip of Mi342.
Mu101	Basic Music Theory	2	This introductory course in music theory covers the fundamentals of music notation, scales, intervals, triads, and general terms. It provides an exposure to sight-singing and dictation.
Mu103	Music Theory for Majors a	2	For Music Majors and Minors. This course in music theory covers the fundamentals of music notation, scales, intervals, triads, and the four part harmonization of figured basses and melodies. Time is spent on sight reading and ear training.
Mu104	Music Theory for Majors a	2	For Music Majors and Minors. This course continues the student in music theory covers the fundamentals of music notation, scales, intervals, triads, and the four part harmonization of figured basses and melodies. Time is spent on sight reading and ear training.
Mu105	Beginning Voice I	1	This study of the vocal instrument and its technical application is designed to teach proper intonation and utilization of the respiratory muscles, vocal chords, pharynx, mouth, nasal cavity, tongue, lip, teeth, palate, and lower jaw. (Lessons for 8 semesters available, 105,6; 205,6; 305,6; 405,6)
Mu107	Beginning Piano I	1	The beginning student is familiarized with the fundamentals of the piano keyboard. (Lessons for 8 semesters available, 107,8; 207,8; 307,8; 407,8)
Mu111	Beginning Violin I	1	Graduated, Private Violin lessons. (Lessons for 6 semesters available, 111,12; 211,12; 311,12)
Mu120	Preacher's Voice	1	The emphasis is on honing the voice to spare the vocal chords of the public speaker and on training the singer to project and to perform well. The delicate voice box is often misused in the preaching ministry. The course is designed to teach vocalization.
Mu201	Counterpoint	2	The chief aim is to awaken the student to the contrapuntal elements in all music, and make him aware of the counterbalancing of two or more melodies sounded simultaneously.
Mu217	Sight Singing	2	Students are drilled in the theory and practice of musical notation. Emphasis is on the development of facility in sight reading, as music literacy is dependent upon such proficiency.

Course #	Course Name	Credits	Course Description
Mu220	Evang. Song Leading	2	The course is tailored to train students in conducting evangelistic singing rather than in more advanced technical, choral, and orchestral training.
Mu310	Music Appreciation	2	This course provides a listening experience in major types of music. The student is acquainted with style and composers. Of various periods: romantic, classic, impressionistic, and American.
Mu313	Music Form & Analysis	2	Musical analysis (its harmonic, formal and structural characteristics) is taught to students through the study of musical masterpieces selected from historical periods ranging from the Renaissance to the twentieth century. Emphasis is on instilling an awareness of style in students. Prerequisite: Mu201.
Mu315	Music History I	2	(Same as Hi315) This two semester study explores the relationships among architecture, fashion, painting, manners, and music. Emphasis is placed on the influence which politics, religion, and geography have played on the formation of each cultural era from ancient Egypt to the present. Two semesters required for music majors.
Mu317	Keyboard Harmony	2	Students are prepared, through instruction and drill, to acquire the basic keyboard proficiency necessary to all musicians who must prepare scores and study music literature for practical use. Required of all music majors.
Mu320	Hymnology I	2	This study of "Psalms, hymns and spiritual songs" emphasizes music performed by professional singers and musicians from the time of temple worship until the time of the early church fathers. Greek and Latin hymns, some in current use, are studied.
Mu321	Hymnology II	2	Second semester of Mu320.
Mu411	Voice Pedagogy	2	Students are initiated into problems and methodology in the science of teaching singing. The physiological, acoustical, and psychological aspects of singing are considered, and practical instruction is given in recognizing and solving problems related to these parameters of the vocal art. Prerequisite: Advanced vocal mastery.
Mu412	Piano Pedagogy	2	Students consider and evaluate at least three of the contemporary piano courses being offered today. Through this study they develop their own methods of piano teaching with an emphasis on proper rhythms and sight-reading geared toward the church musician.
Mu415	Conducting I	2	A study is made of the basic patterns for choral and orchestral conducting, with concentration upon the attainment of conducting techniques. Actual conducting of various secular and sacred compositions is performed with the use of recordings and live choruses, including Handel's "Messiah". Interpretation is stressed.
Mu418	Senior Recital	1	The Senior Recital is required of the music major in one of three areas: voice, instrument or conducting. The student, under the guidance of his applied music teacher, will prepare and perform in public recital an artistic rendering of a program of representative literature for his instrument or voice. This performance may be given only upon approval by the appropriate faculty advisor. Credit is arranged. Covers two semesters.

Course #	Course Name	Credits	Course Description
MuE01	Men's Chorus I	1	Men's Chorus includes coaching of male voices selected after audition. This is an extension group for promotional purposes which also performs for college functions. Lab fee. Credit arranged. (Two semesters, MuE01, MuE02)
MuE11	Belles	2	This is an in-depth study of all musical principles, especially rhythm, rhythm patterns, and chord construction preparatory to ringing hand bells. Lab fee. Credit arranged. (Six semesters, MuE11-16)
MuE17	Ladies Ensemble	2	In this choral extension group, techniques of choral singing in public performances are studied. Basic acquaintance with music is required. Acceptance is by audition and is subject to approval by the department chairperson. Lab fee.
MuE18	Chorale	1	The Midwestern College Chorale.
MuE19	A Cappella Choir I	2	Students are engaged in the solution of problems of choral performance. Music from the a cappella literature is prepared and executed. Lab fee.
MuE20	Choir	1	All voice majors are required to perform in Choir. Participation in other choral groups is on an elective basis. Openings in these groups are announced.
Psy201	Educational Psychology	3	Psychological theory and research findings are applied to the field of education. Major topics include the nature and direction of the learning process, motivation, discipline, the pupil's mental health, intelligence, critical and creative thinking, and principles of human development applicable to the work of the teacher.
Psy202	General Psychology	3	Students become acquainted with the psychology, development, and functions of the human mind. In each part of the study, the student is made aware of the Christian view of this field.
Psy301	Child Development	3	This is a study of the physical, psychological and social development of the child and the relation of his environment to his development. Special problems of child training and social adjustment are treated. Prerequisite: Psy202. Same as Ed301.
Psy302	Adolescent Psychology	3	A study is made of the development and maturation of adolescents with an emphasis on problems of adjustment to personal and social environment. Prerequisite: Psy301.
Psy320	Intro to Counseling	3	This course is designed to equip the pastor, teacher, or layman to deal with problems of Christians, using theories and techniques of psychology in light of the Word of God for accuracy. Students will be introduced to vocational, adolescent, marriage and group counseling. Same as Ed320.
Psy415	Biblical Counseling	3	Basic orientation in counseling for pastors and Christian leaders is provided. The relationship is shown between fundamental theory and practical facts. The sphere of religious counseling is circumscribed, and the student is acquainted with counseling procedures in this sphere. Same as Pt415.
PT217	Christian Ethics	2	A course on Christian Ethics.
PT220	Second Man	2	This course is designed to train men to the ministry of assistant and associate pastor.

Course #	Course Name	Credits	Course Description
PT302	Homiletics	2	Homiletics is the study of sermon building and proper outlining. The emphasis is on preaching that is effective for soul winning and for edifying believers. Practice preaching with critical analysis by class members, and oral reading of the Scriptures are emphasized.
PT306	Practical Church Methods	2	Methods of teaching in the local Church.
PT401	Preaching Practicum I	1	This survey of sermon preparation and delivery makes use of selected books, periodicals and other resources. This course is "team taught" by experienced preachers. Each student is expected to prepare and deliver at least one sermon as partial fulfillment. One semester of Preaching Practicum is required of every ministerial student.
PT402	Preaching Practicum II	1	Cont.
PT404	Baptist History and Polity	2	The development of Baptist churches is studied and related to their beginnings and backgrounds with a correlation in New Testament teaching on the administration and government of the church. Attention is given to the prominence of the local church and on Baptist distinctives.
PT416	Pastoral Theology	2	Attention is given to the qualifications, call and conduct of a pastor. Study is made of the principles and policies involved in conducting such pastoral work as church services, funerals, weddings, baptism, Lord's Supper, the pastor's private and business life, and his study and management of church problems.
Sc301	Biological Science	3	This non-laboratory course in the fundamentals of biology includes botany, zoology, and human physiology. It also includes discussions of Bible related topics.
Sc402	Creation Science	2	A scientific study of creationism is compared with the theory of evolution with emphasis on the Bible account of creation.
So201	Intro to Sociology	2	The principles, concepts, methods, and terminology in the field of sociology are introduced. The relation of culture to group activities, and some of the major social institutions are analyzed.
So301	Sociology	2	This course includes a study of the forms and areas of breakdown in the social structure of modern society. Subjects include alcoholism, drug addiction, delinquency, mental disorders, family disorders, and suicide. Prerequisite: So201.
Sp101	Speech I	2	This introductory course acquaints the student with the basic principles and types of speech, voice production and development, selection, and organization of material, and platform techniques. Specific individual needs are met. Prerequisite for all other speech courses.
